After successful completion of the iEARN Photojournalism 2.0 from August 2012 to September 2013, iEARN Pakistan hosted a PJ2.0 Regional Workshop and Exhibition from August 27 to 30, for teachers and students from Bangladesh, Pakistan and Tajikistan. The four day photojournalism workshop started on 27 August with sessions on Photography and Image Editing. The exhibition for students' work was opened on 28 August by Kimberly Strollo, Cultural Affairs Officer of U.S. Consulate General Karachi.



Talking on the inauguration of photo gallery Kimberly Strollo, Cultural Affairs Officer of U.S. Consulate General, said, "Photojournalism is more than just taking a few pictures; in today's world of social media it is even more critical." She further added that visual messages have power to educate, entertain and persuade. Her message to the young photo journalists was: "Your work can move people to care and take action on issues of importance to society."

The *PJ 2.0 Regional Workshop and Exhibition* included training workshop on photojournalism sessions and photo exhibition. Teachers and students who were part of this program participated in the event. The program included the inaugural of PJ 2.0 photo exhibition, followed by country presentations by teachers and students. Later half of the program included session on 'Advanced Techniques of Photojournalism and Photography', focusing mainly on 'Light' and 'Digital Photostory' sessions. For two days, YES alumni collaborated with 'The Essa Lab' and offered medical to underprivileged people who do not have access to quality healthcare by providing them free diabetes tests, medical check-ups and discounts on other testing services.

Youth Technology Camp by YES Alumni





In the iEARN Technology Camps (August 20 - September 7), the focus of the YES Alumni trainers was on enhancing the knowledge of students about basic social media and positive usage of citizen journalism. The interactive technology based sessions were conducted in Kohat, Abbottabad, Attock and Islamabad, respectively. Nearly 200 students participated in the camp benefited and became student journalists from their regions, while 25 YES alumni participated as the trainers sharing their valuable expertise to make the camp a success for everyone.

The participating students learned about the effective use of social media campaigns through online forums and experienced their usefulness for the promotion of cross-cultural learning. All the sessions were designed in a manner to ensure adequate learning experience for the students so that they could practice further, implement their learning after the camp and replicate the knowledge through acquired skills.

"Project Re-Educate was a 3-day workshop, conducted on 26-28 September by YES Alumni KPK, focused on motivating the students of Al-Asar Academy, Kohat to learn and work for the betterment of community. During the workshop, the students learned about various sessions through interactive games and activities. The sessions were: Team Building, Cleanliness of Environment, Recycling, Child Rights, Capacity/Confidence Building, Importance of Community Services, Time Management etc. Each session was designed in a manner to share maximum information with the students and motivate them to learn further about them at school and home. These sessions were conducted by a group of YES Alumni Pakistan.

Focus Group Discussion (FGD) with O3 participants

Focus Group Discussion (FGD) was conducted for O3 (Our Family, Our Neighborhood, Our World) project on 20 September. iEARN staff visited the participating schools of O3 program to conduct FGDs with students. Some groups of students from three O3 schools also visited iEARN Centre, Islamabad later in the afternoon for discussion. The objective focus group discussions was to understand what teachers and students feel being a Punjabi and what is their understanding of the Punjabi culture in India and Pakistan, and to share thoughts and concerns about peace in the region.

O3 Training for Year 2 teachers and students

A full day training workshop was conducted for a group of 21 educators and 25 students at iEARN Centre Islamabad for *O3: Our Family, Our Neighborhood, Our World* project on September 21, 2013. The group consisted of teachers and educators of both the new schools and returning schools from different towns and villages near Rawalpindi and Islamabad. The workshop focused at introducing participants with core program concepts, better understanding of methodologies used - such as performing arts- and the importance of building core competencies within students like leadership and collaboration. Various sessions of the workshop included team building, cultural art activities and theatre performances. The participants took great interest and participated actively in the session activities. Students did an amazing job of preparing cultural banners and performed short skits.

Alexis Sullivan, Assistant Cultural Affairs Officer, US Embassy Islamabad visited the iEARN Center, Islamabad and met with participating teachers and students. Ms. Sullivan appreciated the cultural presentations and performances done by the participants. The participants shared their experiences, learning and the impact of *O3 Program*.

The **O3: Our Family, Our Neighborhood, Our World,** is an educational initiative to foster cross-cultural understanding and social ties by connecting students, educators, and artists in East and West Punjab (India and Pakistan) and the United States through the use of multimedia, music, dance, and theatre.

Orientation Session for Teachers of Adobe Youth Voices 2013-14
